WEARDALE RAILWAY RECONNECTED NETWORK RAIL COMPLETE TRACKWORK AT BISHOP AUCKLAND LINE CLEARED AFTER BLOCKAGE BY FALLEN TREES 73139 IN SERVICE AND IN WEARDALE RAILWAY LIVERY

- **Project Connect: RMS Locotec team :** The team have completed work on the first phase of the project, namely the re-sleepering and other remedial work between Wolsingham and Witton le Wear. They now move on to the next phase between Witton le Wear and Witton Park which includes the section over the viaduct. Alongside them GBL Drainage Clearance are working in the 'Project Connect' possession. They will be utilising road-rail and standard plant including road rail drainage machine, and a tractor mounted flail . A new Operating Department Notice (09/01) is now in force governing operations east of the Wolsingham Depot Limits. (A Gregory. D L Heath)
- Network reconnection news: As the photographs below show the Weardale Railway is now reconnected to the main Network at Bishop Auckland. The turnout is now completed, all that remains is to complete the circuit testing between the turnout and Shildon signal box. This work is expected to be complete within the next two weeks. - **Project Connect: Drainage Works :** A contract has been placed with Geoff Brown Ltd (GBL) to carry out drain jetting at various locations between our boundary at Bishop Auckland and Witton Park. GBL provided a 3 man team last week which carried out preliminary work to facilitate the jetting operation. This included flailing the south side of the railway from the boundary to Paradise Crossing following which catch pits were located and cleared. DCC will renew a section of drain under Escomb Bridge which was incorrectly installed during the bridge reconstruction and then construct a storm overflow down the bank side and connect it into our lineside system. This will prevent the flooding experienced at the bridge during periods of exceptional rainfall. Our Projects Group will excavate several lengths of overgrown ditches before jetting is carried out in mid September. Hopefully at the end of the works we will have a dry cutting for the first time since the 1960's. (T Horner)
- New Volunteers: A welcome on board to two new volunteer members who were inducted recently: Mark Woodhams and Rozeena Fawad, both are from Bishop Auckland. (D Million, M Wilkinson)

Project Connect: Bridge Works: DCC are completely refurbishing bridge no. 12, which lies approx. 400m east of the Escomb village bridge. The bridge is an interesting structure in the form of a "bow-sprung" single span, laid on a skew and carrying a bridleway. It is Grade II listed and therefore consent had to be obtained from English Heritage before works started, as the parapet height needed to be extended to fit modern standards. Work commenced several weeks ago with the removal of all the wooden decking and parapets. The framework of the bridge, which consists of wrought and cast iron members was then shot blasted and fully painted. Several metal repairs were found necessary, including the replacement of broken and missing sections. With this work now completed re-decking is due to commence this week.(T Horner)

- **Operations Department Announcement: Training Officer:** It is with very great pleasure that I write to inform you that Fred Ramshaw has been appointed as the Weardale Railway Training Officer. Initially, he will concentrate on steam operation but will gradually extend his activities to all of the other footplate areas as and when he is ready to take on board these additional responsibilities. He will write to you in due course to let you know what he intends to do and how and, most importantly of all, in what way he envisages that he will interact with those of you who are involved/have intentions of being involved with footplate volunteering. - In Case of Emergency Cards to be introduced: The Weardale Railway Management is to introduce the concept of ICE cards. (ICE = "In Case of Emergency".) The idea is that each one of us completes a small card which gives details of the person who is to be contacted if the individual is unlucky enough to be taken ill/suffer an injury whilst working on the Weardale Railway. If appropriate, it also contains information about medication so that, should such a person have to have medical treatment on site or, subsequently, at a local hospital then all the relevant information is available to the medics. The system will be run by the Document Controller and a copy of each card will be kept in the control office readily accessible so that, if the worst happens, the information is available for action. It will not be compulsory but it is hoped that everybody will participate for their own benefit. The Document Controller will be writing to you individually. (D L Heath)

• Passenger Services: Class 73 replaces No. 40: The plan to utilise no 40 for 15 days in August had to modified when further running in the first two weekends revealed problems with the boiler crown stays and the associated nuts and washers and with the LH driving axlebox. Fixing the latter requires the use of lifting jacks which have now been obtained from the RMS store in Wakefield. Completion of the work will commence once our Maintenance manager returns from leave. It is hoped to have the loco operational again for the War on Line weekend. Meanwhile the newly refurbished and also repainted Class 73 was pressed into service with the coaching stock. Special mention here to Norman Swindle for putting in several extra days as volunteer driver on 73139. (A Gregory, M Fairburn)
