No 40 BACK IN STEAM ON SANTA SPECIALS WEARDALE RAILWAYS AND UK COAL ANNOUNCE PLANS FOR A COAL LOADING FACILITY AT WOLSINGHAM HMRI INSPECTION OF FULL LINE IN JANUARY 2010

• **PROJECT CONNECT 1: BROKEN BANKS – WORK COMPLETED:** The longstanding blockage caused by subsidence of the trackbed at this location between Escomb and Bishop Auckland has now been rectified. As mentioned in previous updates, the profile of the trackbed has now been restored and the last step, the relaying of ballast and re-profiling was completed over the last 3 weeks. This was the last major operation in getting the track ready for inspection. The location will still need continual monitoring as subsidence at this point has been occurring since at least British Rail days and probably longer. The Company has engaged a geological engineering consultancy to recommend suitable long term remedial measures at this location.

- **PROJECT CONNECT 2:** By early December only 3 more days of re-sleeepering remain to be completed by the team from BARS affiliate RMS Locotec. The team estimate they have replaced close to 3000 sleepers over the last 3 months. Some work remains to be done on fencing and signage needs to be put in place. Meanwhile work in the yard is well underway in preparing the site for a coal loading facility. The depot has been cleared of surplus or non serviceable stock three of the original sidings have been removed and one newly positioned siding relaid. This will make room for one long siding to accommodate the coal wagons for loading from an adjacent pad. As part of the project additional land has been leased from the adjacent landowner for the extended loading siding.
- **HMRI INSPECTION**: The newly restored and reopened section of line from Wolsingham to Bishop Auckland will receive its inspection in January currently scheduled dates are 25th, 26th January. The Inspection is carried out by Her Majesties Railway Inspectorate –a division of the Office of the Rail Regulator. The first scheduled passenger train will be the February 19th UK Railtours charter from Kings Cross to Stanhope.
- DATE FOR THE DIARY: DECEMBER 28: aka 'WORK THE CHRISTAMAS PUDDING OFF DAY': Join fellow enthusiasts and volunteers at Stanhope station on of December 28th from 10.00 am until 3.30pm. To give you a flavour here is what John Askwith said last year "It was a good days work which included leaf clearing, strimming and bulb planting, dismantling the grotto (Junior Club) and friendly banter to boot! • COAL TRAINS FROM WOLSINGHAM: The first step in the process of formalising the arrangements to transport coal from Wolsingham depot to power stations further south was announced this week. A public exhibition will be held in Wolsingham Town Hall on Monday 14th December. The coal would come from the recently approved development at Park Wall North between Crook and Wolsingham - the site has the capacity to produce 1.27 million tonnes of coal and 500,000 tones of fireclay over 5 years.. The ability of the Weardale Railway to assist in moving the coal by rail will greatly reduce the environmental and community impacts by reducing highway usage. The announcement is shown below.

- No 40 BACK IN ACTION: No 40 was ready for the first Santa special weekend of November 28/29 and performed perfectly, as she also did the following weekend. The problem with the over heating axle bearings was traced to unsatisfactory modifications made at some time in its earlier history. These would not show up in the shorter runs with lighter loads and no gradients at its previous location. We managed to trace the original design drawings (thsanks to Arthur Temple) and with a lot of hard work by Steve Race, Andrew XXXXX and Graham Richardson and others and some excellent work in manufacturing new bearings by Richard Campbell, it would appear that this particular problem has been solved. On the second weekend No40 pulled a 5coach train 'up the hill' (3 Mk1's + Griddle car+ Mike Woods support coach)
- WITTON le WEAR CABIN COMPLETED: The dedicated group who have been working on the once near derelict cabin at the Crossing have now competed their work and judging by the photographs they can be proud of their work. All that remains is the fitting of a new sign above the door and reconnection to all the services (water and phone) and the cabin will be ready to be restored to its original role plus in the future it may become the control centre for the railway when regular services are established through Bishop Auckland.
