SECOND 141 UNIT ARRIVES IN WEARDALE

STILL SOME SEATS ON THE CHARTER FROM DARLINGTON TO STANHOPE ON SUNDAY JUNE 20 - £19 return

• **JUST ARRIVED – A SECOND 141 DIESEL MULTIPLE UNIT :** The Weardale Railway acquired a second two car 141 unit on Thursday June 10th. Alistair Gregory oversaw its removal from the Midland Railway Centre at Butterley and the safe arrival at Wolsingham depot the same day. It was out on the line the same night and met our own 141 on its return from the Community Service. The unit is in full working order and will provide back up for the increased services we are now running as well as being able to work in multiple with the other unit at times of increased demand. Our existing 141 has the original Leyland engine and transmission, the new unit (141113) has a Cummins engine and Voigt transmission

- **GENERAL MANAGER POST RESPONSIBILITIES:** WR General Manager, Malcolm Dean has to leave us for a few weeks because of a pre existing work commitment. During the period of his absence David Million will once again assume the responsibility of Acting General Manager. Graham Isom from Dartmoor Railway will be joining Alistair Gregory to help support the ever crucial role of maintaining the service.
- TEMPORARY PLATFORMS FOR DALE SHOWS? : In response to press queries, General Manager, Malcolm Dean said the plans were just ideas at the moment but were being actively considered. Richard Mews from the Stanhope show committee said the railway could provide visitors with an attractive alternative to get to the show. It's another travel option especially from Bishop Auckland. Stanhope show is on September 12 and 13th and Wolsingham September 4 to 6th.
- **NEXT HMRI INSPECTION AUGUST**: At the time of his last visit the Inspector gave us a list of less critical items which he wanted to see completed before giving his final approval. This visit is due in early August. Steve Goodwin and his team from RMS, assisted on occasion by the Sunday Gang, are working through this list which involves work on the track, drainage and general infrastructure tasks.

- BISHOPFM COVERAGE OF WR: Terry Ferdinand of Bishop FM was one of the guests at the reopening ceremony and writes "as one of the media there on the day, I took photos and have video of the full speeches on the platform by Lord Forster, Wilf Hume and Ed Ellis. I also recorded interviews and video on the train, and hope to make a radio programme from what I have, for broadcast on Bishopfm."

• JUNE 20: CHARTER FROM ALNMOUTH, NEWCASTLE, DURHAM AND DARLINGTON – STILL SEATS AVAILABLE: Want to travel on a through train from any of these stations to Stanhope? Some seats should still be available on the day. The operator (North East Railtours) only has indicative timings as Network Rail has, of the date of this Newsletter, not provided the operational timings. A standard class return from Darlington will cost £19 where the train should depart between 11.30 and noon. The tour will be Class 47 hauled, top and tailed, Mk 1 stock with a Buffet Car. Return from Stanhope should be around 15.45 – 16.00 hrs. More details in the box below:-

Return fares from Darlington: Standard Class: £19, (Child £10), 1st Class: £29 (Child £20). Final Darlington departure times still to be finalised – between 11.30 and noon most likely.

• SUNDAY JUNE 20: SERVICES TO BE REVISED: WR services on the 20th June will need to be revised to accommodate the incoming Charter from Northumberland. At the moment we do not have the handover times at B Auckland from Network Rail, but it will most likely be between noon at 12.30 hrs. If this is the case the most likely scenario is that the 11.43 ex Wolsingham to B Auckland and the 12.40 return from B Auckland will not be operated (either as Heritage or substitute DMU services). It should still be possible to run the remaining four community services to and from B Auckland and also two round trips of Heritage stock and haulage between Stanhope and Wolsingham. It is unlikely we will be able to confirm the operating timetable until Wednesday 17th June.

- CLASS G5 NEWBUILD MAKING PROGRESS: The Company formed under the Chairmanship of our own Mike Wood is making steady progress in building a completely new version of this former NER designed 0-4-4 tank engine which was once a common sight on many North Eastern branch lines. The project plan, developed by David Elliott, is ensuring that the various sub-assemblies are completed in the correct order, on time and within budget. The first visible outcome of this process will be that the bogie, including wheels etc., will be completed and painted and put on show at locomotion at Locomotion in Shildon by the end of July. WEARDALE RAILWAY TRUST LOCOMOTIVE No. 40: APPEAL FOR FUNDS

The Trust owned 0-6-0 tank engine is our single largest asset. It was built in 1954 by Robert Stephenson and Hawthorne to carry passengers on the NCB system in Northumberland. Like all steam locomotives it requires boiler recertification every 10 years and the current certificate expires in October 2012.

After its recent repairs the Locomotive is performing well and hopefully will carry out three more summers of work on our Heritage services. But we do now need to start thinking ahead and planning and saving for the next major expenditure in making the boiler fit for recertification. Additionally there are other modifications improvements and replacements we need to make to the running gear and to improve the performance of the locomotive.

This will cost a significant amount of money and although we keep costs to a minimum with the help of our loyal band of volunteers there are certain parts of the work that has to be done by specialist firms.

So, how much will be needed? Our estimate to cover both the recertification and the modifications is £95,000. The Trust estimates that it should be able to provide £55,000 from its own funds by October 2012, so the objective of this appeal is to raise £40,000 over the next two and a half years.

With the kind help of contributors from the Trust both locally and nationally – even internationally, we were able to raise over £30,000 in the last appeal – we hope we can rely again on your generosity in these more difficult times to keep the sound and sight of a steam engine working in Weardale.

In return for your contributions the Trust and Weardale Railways CIC have joined together to provide the incentives shown below. Foremost is a print of a truly splendid photograph by Trust member John Lewins whose work has also appeared in the Railway press. The harsh winter we have just experienced provided some excellent photographic opportunities and John took advantage of these on December 20 by capturing this scene of No 40 hauling a Santa Special passing near Holbeck 4. It is shown below on a small scale and in low resolution. On the larger scales being offered this photograph really does capture steam , snow and the atmosphere of Weardale to perfection. John has kindly offered to carry out the work of printing and laminating himself, so you can be sure of a quality product.
